The revision involves:

1. Requiring courses
2. Flexibility of options of electives.
3. Requiring a thesis or research paper.

REVISED PROGRAM OF STUDIES
Master of Science Degree, Department of Health Science

The general requirements for the Master of Science degree include a minimum of thirty-three graduate hours of course work as determined by the student in cooperation with his or her major advisor, a minimum of twenty-one hours must be taken at the 600 level.

All students are required to complete the following courses:

Cognate Electives: the remaining hours of course work may be made up of elective graduate courses approved by the major advisor from the fields of Psychology, Sociology, Anthropology, Biology, and Philosophy.

Options for Degree completion:

1. Students may choose to prepare a thesis to complete the degree requirements. They will receive six hours of graduate credit.
A comprehensive oral examination will be required.
2. Students not choosing to write a thesis will be required to write an acceptable major paper for which they will receive three hours of graduate credit, complete three additional hours of recommended graduate course work, and take a written and oral comprehensive examination.

Students upon matriculation must indicate the program completion option.
The above revised program will become effective September, 1973.
