PROPOSED SATISFACTORY/UNSATISFACTORY GRADING POLICY

Be it resolved that effective Fall, 1983, the Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory Grading Policy be changed to include the following:

1. A grade of "S" (satisfactory) shall indicate that the work completed is equivalent to a grade of "C" or better.
2. Courses registered on an exclusive S/U basis (e.g., GEP 100 Dimensions of Liberal Education, internships, student teaching, etc.) do not count toward the maximum of four S/U courses that a student may count toward degree requirements.

To implement the above, two clarifications are necessary:

1. Courses may be registered on an exclusive S/U basis only if they are a part of a program and are so registered with that program.
2. All college publications refer to this grading option as Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory rather than Pass/Fail.
